

PULITZER PRIZE WINNER

Shreveport Native Wins Pulitzer Prize

Shreveport native Jericho Brown (born Nelson Demery III) has won the 2020 Pulitzer Prize in Poetry for his collection "The Tradition," which the Pulitzer board deemed "a collection of masterful lyrics that combine delicacy with historical urgency in their loving evocation of bodies vulnerable to hostility and violence."

His poetry has been featured in The Bennington Review, BuzzFeed, Fence, jubilat, The New Republic, The New York Times, The New Yorker, The Paris Review, TIME magazine, and several volumes of The Best American Poetry. 81Hi-EtgiHL "I'm happy to bring this

prize back home, and by that I mean back to Black folks, back to the South, back to Louisiana, and back to my alma mater, Dillard University. Dillard is where I first took creative writing workshops as classes toward my major, and it's where I first began to envision a life for myself as a writer," Dillard University graduate shared in a statement. "These are not easy times for any of us, but I'd like to believe that this prize in this particular instance can show that there is still possibility for us no matter how rough the terrain may seem. And I'm grateful to have gotten the education necessary to make

ICYMI: LSU Survey Finds A Majority of Louisianans are Following the Stay at Home Order

BATON ROUGE — The Man-ship School of Mass Communication at Louisiana State University released a non-partisan report that shows a majority of Louisianans say they are following Gov. Edwards' Stay at Home Order and support the federal, state and local governments' response to COVID-19. The survey showed widespread compliance with the Stay at Home Order and other public health recommendations to help slow the spread of the coronavirus. According to the survey, four out of five Louisianans say they have not left home for reasons that violate the governor's order.

Specifically, about mitigation measures, the report found:

- Intentions to wear face coverings and to maintain at least 6 feet of distance from other people when outside the home increase to 59% and 86%, respectively.
 - 84% say they maintain at least 6 feet of distance from other people very often or always.
 - 75% of Louisiana adults say they very often wash their hands with soap for at least 20 seconds each time, and 50% say they disinfect frequently used surfaces in their homes very often.
- Overall, the LSU Man-ship School Survey found that 64% of residents approve of the state's response to COVID-19 and that 74% of respondents believe the United

States and Louisiana should continue measures to slow the spread of the coronavirus, such as stay-at-home orders and social distancing, even if it means some businesses remain closed.



it to this moment."

After graduating from Dillard in 1998, he earned a master's in fine arts at the University of New Orleans and later a Ph.D. from the University of Houston.

Brown's Pulitzer Prize win was no surprise to Dillard faculty members, especially Mona Lisa Saloy, Ph.D, folklorist and professor of English. "While [he was] a student here, [Brown] wore business suits daily with a matching bow tie, along with his fellow male classmates aiming for the study of law. They were serious about school and worked hard," she said. "Indeed, he had 'that something,' and I urged him to consider that perhaps he was sent here for something more than the Law, that there

was a fine writer buried inside of him, just waiting to be released."

Brown is currently an associate professor and the director of the creative writing program at Emory University. He is the recipient of several fellowships from Guggenheim Foundation, the Radcliffe Institute for Advanced Study at Harvard, and the National Endowment for the Arts. He is also the winner of the Whiting Award. Brown's first book, Please, won the American Book Award and his second book, The New Testament won the Anisfield-Wolf Book Award. The Tradition is his third collection of poetry.

The Pulitzer Prize was funded and established in 1917 by the will of journalist and newspaper publisher Joseph Pulitzer. It is awarded in 22 categories, focusing on journalism, literature, drama, history, and music.

CBP New Orleans Receives First African American Female Port Director

NEW ORLEANS, La. - When Terri Edwards reported to U.S. Customs and Border Protection's (CBP) Port of New Orleans on March 30, the port was in a state of uncertainty. Mayor LaToya Cantrell had just issued a stay-at-home order in response to the rapid spread of COVID-19 throughout the city.

In response to the order, CBP New Orleans launched an aggressive telework policy, allowing many of their employees to work from home. Officers who could not work from home were placed on alternating schedules to minimize risk of contracting the virus.

"I was determined to hit the ground running and make sure that our workforce had all of the protective equipment needed in order to perform their duties safely, and do everything possible to minimize their risk of being infected with COVID-19," Edwards said. "Throughout the past four weeks, I have witnessed employees, both uniformed and non-uniform, going above and beyond. It makes me extremely proud to lead such an excellent workforce."

Despite the challenges that came with maintaining the Port of New Orleans mission during the COVID-19 pandemic, Edwards, formerly the Director of CBP's Analytical Management Systems Control Office (AMSCO) in Washington D.C., said her experience as Port Director has been rewarding, and she has learned a lot about the mission and the people who maintain the mission. To date, the port has hired more than 30 new officers while continuing to process cruise line crew members and repatriating U.S. citizens returning home due to the COVID-19 threat. Additionally, the port has also supported local and federal law enforcement in facilitating legitimate travel and trade throughout Louisiana.

"I believe that the Area Port of New Orleans is in a great position right now," she said. "We are bringing in a lot of new officers who are eager to get to work. One of my main goals is to keep them motivated and ensure that they have all of the tools and resources necessary to get the job done. I want New Orleans to be known as one of the best places to work in CBP!"

CBP New Orleans Director of Field Operations Steven Stavinoha added that Edwards

coming to New Orleans also has a deeper value.

"Knowing the cultural and diverse value that the City of New Orleans represents in the United States, I am proud to have Ms. Edwards accept this new chapter in her career and congratulate her in her new leadership role as the first African American female Port Director in New Orleans."

Being the first African American female port director in a city known for having a historically diverse culture is an honor she said she doesn't take lightly.

"I'm proud to work for an agency that embraces diversity," she said. "We all have something different to bring to the table, and in my opinion, that's exactly what makes us stronger and better as an agency."

It is that strength, she said, that will get CBP New Orleans through this pandemic.

"I've never backed away from a challenge," she said. "I believe that is how we learn and become better officers. I'm looking forward to the resumption of normal business operations. I believe that we, as a nation, have learned a lot from this pandemic. We will emerge from this much stronger!"

The Port of New Orleans is located in the historic U.S. Custom House, located on Canal Street in the Central Business District of New Orleans. Its area of operation covers 250 miles of the Mississippi River, including ports of entry in Gramercy, Morgan City, Shreveport, Lake Charles, and Baton Rouge.

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Baker, La COVID-19 Drive Thru Test Site Opening May 6

BAKER, La.— Mayor Waites is pleased to announce the opening of a COVID-19 drive-through testing facility in the City of Baker, in coordination with Walmart, Quest Diagnostics, parish and state officials which will be available to test anyone who has symptoms of COVID-19 ; All healthcare providers and first responders are welcome and encouraged to utilize the testing site regardless if they currently have symptoms.

"It is critical that we are able to perform mass testing of the population." Mayor Waites has advised the public previously. We urge anyone who suspects they may be ill and who are exhibiting symptoms to utilize this testing site while following all prescribed safety precautions while in public.

We are grateful to our community partners for coming together with us, so as leaders we may ensure the health and welfare of our most precious asset, the people of our community. It is an honor to be able to serve our community with like-minded leaders in good faith to our people.

DETAILS:

- Testing will be located at the Baker Walmart Parking Lot: 14507 Plank Rd, Baker, LA 70714
- There is no out-of-pocket cost for individuals
- A doctor's order is not required to receive the test, but patients will need to make an appointment
- There is no testing inside Walmart stores
- The testing site requires an appointment through Quest's MyQuestTM online portal and app. You will receive an appointment confirmation that you will need to have on hand when you arrive onsite
- No walk-ups will be seen
- Persons wishing to obtain testing at this site should go to www.MyQuestCOVIDTest.com in order to complete the Quest scheduling process
- If you do not have access to a computer or smartphone onsite registration will be available at the Quest mobile site.
- Please make sure to bring

a valid photo ID for proof of identity

- Persons wishing to obtain testing at this site should go to www.MyQuestCOVIDTest.com in order to complete the Quest scheduling process
- If you do not have access to a computer or smartphone onsite registration will be available at the Quest mobile site.
- Please make sure to bring a valid photo ID for proof of identity
- Please arrive no more than 10 minutes before your appointment time
- Those being tested will need to wear a mask stay in their cars for verification of eligibility criteria, ID check and sample self-collection. For the safety of all those on-site, the test site is not able to service those who walk up
- Individuals being tested will perform a self-administered nasal swab in their car with a healthcare provider observing them. Directions will be provided in the confirmation email after scheduling the appointment and on-site. If you do not believe you will be able to self-administer the nasal swab, please bring someone with you who can assist you
- It is important to take care of yourself and monitor your symptoms closely. If your symptoms do not improve or you develop new or worsening symptoms, seek medical attention right away. Do not wait to receive your results

RESULTS:

Individuals being tested will receive their COVID-19 test results through the secure MyQuest online portal or app and may receive a call from our telehealth partner PWN to review results

The average turnaround time to report results is 2 – 3 days from the day of collection

For everyone's safety and for the privacy of those being tested, media should not attempt to enter the testing site.

NO INFORMATION RELATIVE TO PATIENTS, TEST RESULTS OR APPOINTMENTS WILL BE MANAGED OR DISCLOSED TO THE CITY OF BAKER.

The Move to Reopen America is Not a 'Black Friendly' Campaign

As protests erupt over stay-at-home orders and the clamor to reopen the economy becomes louder, the coalition of people storming state Capitols — some armed with semi-automatic weapons and most not wearing masks or observing social distancing guidelines — have had one thing in common: Almost all of them are white.

African Americans, for the most part, are not joining the crowds in California, Michigan, Georgia, Wisconsin and other parts of the country to demand that local governments reopen their cities.

For many black Americans, the general perception is that the throngs of white protesters are steeped in racism, white supremacy and anti-black sentiments. And so many black Americans would feel unwelcome — and perhaps afraid — given the presence of Confederate flags, swastikas and hangman's nooses.

"This is identity politics, this is not COVID-19 as an actual issue, said Dr. Samuel K. Roberts, director of Columbia University's Institute for Research in African American Studies and an epidemiologist. "First of all, if you look at who these people are, I don't know many black folks of any political stripe that would want to be in that crowd."

"These are the same people who called Obama all sorts of names, racist epithets, a lot of them overlap with the Tea Party, which was a very racially charged movement," Roberts said. "Nothing about this movement is really black friendly."

"This is very much an identity politics issue, let's be clear about that, and I say that because people on the right, and a lot of people in the middle of the line Democratic Party, talk about identity politics and it's just code for women and people of color," he said. "White people have actual issues, while women and people of color have identity politics."

Black Americans are dying in disproportionate numbers from COVID-19 in the United States; people of color are especially exposed because they are more likely to hold many of the jobs that were deemed essential; and, as the reopening starts, they are likely to be among those whose workplaces open first. For instance, in New York City, the epicenter of the U.S. outbreak, African Americans make up just under 25% of the population, but more than 40% of public transit workers.

Delmonte Jefferson, a black public health professional in Atlanta, said African Americans and other people of color want to

mitigate the economic damage as much as anyone else — especially since those groups are among the ones who are suffering the most from the downturn. But they don't want a return at all costs, he said.

"Even the thought of opening the country back up shows that African Americans aren't being valued," said Jefferson, executive director of the Atlanta-based National African American Tobacco Prevention Network.

Despite the ongoing protests and willingness of some states to reopen aspects of their economies, some black leaders have been adamant that communities of color stay at home given that COVID-19 is disproportionately affecting African Americans, Latinos and Native Americans.

"We, the undersigned, have joined together to state our unequivocal and firm opposition to the premature effort of governors to fully reopen their

states," read a statement signed by among others, Sherrilyn Ifill, president and director-counsel of the NAACP's Legal Defense and Education Fund; the Rev. Al Sharpton, head of the National Action Network; and Marc Morial, president of the National Urban League. "We regard this pandemic as a grave threat to the health and life of our people."

Officials who have been critical of the demonstrations have also been careful to downplay them, even as they acknowledge that race and racism is a factor.

Donations for the Feed Louisiana Love campaign can be made at feedlouisianalove.com. Donors can select which food bank they want to send money to or select Feed Louisiana Love to spread their donation equally among all five food banks.

Patty says volunteers are staying home, and community organizations have been forced to close all at a time of high demand for services.

"We're getting food to our affiliates, but distribution is a challenge," he says. "Monetary donations are critical to helping us coordinate within our network so that food can go to the places where it's needed most."
